Defining our terms

Defining our terms

- Dysphoric/non-dysphoric trans
- Experience or ontology
- Transition Experiences (Social, Medical, etc)
- Emerging gender identities
 - Non-binary
 - Genderfluid
 - Agender



This cultural moment

- 1931 Dora Richter (Berlin) becomes one of the first known people to undergo gender reassignment surgery
- 1964 Academics establish the term 'gender identity' to propose that someone's gender identity is not always the same as their biological sex
- 1970 Corbett vs Corbett court case
- 2002 Goodwin vs United Kingdom court case
- 2004 Creation of the Gender Recognition Act





This cultural moment

- 2015 Bruce Jenner gives an interview to ABC news discussing gender identity and adopts the name Caitlyn later that year.
- 2020 J. K. Rowling receives a furious backlash on social media for her views on gender inclusive language.
- 2021 Brighton & Sussex University Hospitals NHS Trust becomes the first in the UK to introduce a 'gender inclusive language policy'.





This cultural moment

- So... what is going on here?
 - Expressive Individualism Life finds meaning and purpose through the expression of internal desires & emotions
 - Critical Theory Society is a power struggle between oppressed and oppressor
 - Postmodernism Truth is subjective one person's truth can differ from another's

A Christian Understanding

Genesis 1:26-28

- Male/Female are of equal value the bible doesn't ever separate gender from sex
- There is purpose in the way we are created
- **Proverbs 31:10-31**
- Gender stereotypes are cultural, not biblical Galatians 3:26-29
- In Christ, there will be no oppression Hebrews 4:15-16
- We have a saviour who understands our pain
- There is nothing that cannot be redeemed



A pastoral approach

Considerations when responding to pastoral dilemmassssss:

- Scripture Does the Bible address this issue? What principles are at play?
- Safeguarding What risks are there to the person or others?
- Sharing Will there be an impact your future ability to share the gospel?
- Speech What will your decision communicate to the person involved?
- Stability Is your approach consistent with related issues?
- Sin Could your own sin/prejudice be affecting your judgement?





Galatians 5:13-26

You, my brothers and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love. For the entire law is fulfilled in keeping this one command: "Love your neighbour as yourself." If you bite and devour each other, watch out or you will be destroyed by each other.

So I say, walk by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the flesh. For the flesh desires what is contrary to the Spirit, and the Spirit what is contrary to the flesh. They are in conflict with each other, so that you are not to do whatever you want. But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under the law.



Galatians 5:13-26

The acts of the flesh are obvious: sexual immorality, impurity and debauchery; idolatry and witchcraft; hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions and envy; drunkenness, orgies, and the like. I warn you, as I did before, that those who live like this will not inherit the kingdom of God.

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Against such things there is no law. Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other



A pastoral approach

Love: In all things will the good of the other person

Joy: Keep perspective — this is A thing, not THE thing

Peace: Move the conversation on — don't keep arguing but seek peace

Forbearance/Patience: Remember, we're dealing with people

Kindness: Be kind to ourselves — model acceptance of our own bodies

Goodness: Engage with God, engage with other things in His creation


Faithfulness: Continue sharing the goodness of God's design

Gentleness: Establish small points of connection


Self-control: Don't make conversations about your own emotions


